# **MAY 2022 Time with Tom**

The month of May, a time when the fields should already be showing signs of growth. Early spring gets us motivated to move quickly and gives us a hopeful outlook to harvest. We are a church that lives in hope and the earthly things around us can motivate us. Being motivated is okay if the motivation is for the wellbeing of others and not at the expense of the poor or the homeless.

Paul had to write to the churches often to remind them of their call as a church. The church is not self-serving, the church is not a place to boast or brag. The church has requirements that are set not by humans but by God. Micah 6:8 says: "he has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your Lord". The church often looses focus and turns in on itself. Paul also tells the church to be less concerned with personal gifts and more concerned with love. Gifts of the Spirit are good but the better is to have love. Love as a gift from God comes from a cross and an empty tomb. Love for our neighbor can often times feel like we are persecuted or alone and usually a little of both. God loves us so much he sent his son to show us what true love is and we killed him.

We should take the opportunity in our motivation of hope and share it with others. When we see green fields we are reminded of what God does for us, out of love. We have all we need everyday because God loves us. We can share all we have because that is what God tells us to do. Let our motivation be for the love of our neighbor.

As individuals we make up the church but together our gifts can make the world a better place. Share your gift of love with all people and remember what is required of you as you watch the fields turn green with God's love for all his creation. May can be a beautiful time of year, an example of God's love blooming all around us.

She also discussed the current housing they have in place and plans to grow the availability to meet greater needs. The program is designed to offer a "hand up", not just a "hand out". #### God's hands

Exactly a century ago, Irish physician Alexander Irvine published *My Lady of the Chimney Corner*, a book dedicated to his saintly mother. The protagonist, Anna, lives and ministers to others as Irvine's own mother had done.

In the story, Anna visits a neighbor who has just lost a son at sea. After talking for a while, Anna suggests they pray together. With heads bowed, she reaches to place a loving hand on the grieving mother's forehead. Afterward, the woman says, "I think I felt his touch upon my brow," referring to God.

Anna says, "God is everywhere looking for hands to use. Sometimes he takes the hand of a doctor and uses it in healing. Sometimes he takes the hand of a mother to soothe the brow of a fevered child. And sometimes he takes the hand of an old critter like me to bring a bit of help and comfort to a neighbor. But they are all God's hands, and God is everywhere looking for hands to use."

# **Mission**

Dear friends,

After two years of restricted movement due to the Corona virus pandemic the Evangelical Lutheran Church in

Zambia is on the move again. (Recently I was able to visit Zambia together with Rev. Dr. Elitha Moyo, ELCA Regional Representative for Gender Justice and Programs.)

The long planned for construction of a church head office, sanctuary and parsonage started with a groundbreaking ceremony and clearing of the building site at Matero Parish in Lusaka. The church building committee has been hard at work getting all the necessary permits, approving architect's plans and hiring a building contractor. They are hoping for completion of the project before the end of the year.



At Kamwala Parish the LUCSA Infohut Project is ready to begin. The Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa (LUCSA) Infohut Project aims for an HIV&AIDS free generation and is designed to teach young people

computer skills and life skills in a six-month long intensive course. In the afternoons students and members of the community can make use of the computers and internet.

The ELCZa recently welcomed ELCA missionary Pastor Kristin Engstrom to serve as Facilitator of Leadership Development and Capacity Building. Preaching on Palm Sunday Pastor Engstrom encouraged the women to wave their chitenge cloths in the air, just like those who shouted "Hosanna!" waved palm branches when Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey.





The Senior Pastor Rev. Njapau expressed appreciation on behalf of the ELCZa to the ELCA for continuing to accompany and to support the church and the people of Zambia.

The Upstate New York Synod is a companion synod to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zambia and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zimbabwe.

The ELCA is committed to accompanying

companion churches in Southern Africa as they faithfully engage in proclamation of the Gospel, mission outreach and work to mitigate the impact of poverty, HIV&AIDS, climate change, Gender-based violence, conflict and the COVID-19 pandemic in the communities they serve.

### Ukrainian Lutheran Church

The second renaissance Ukrainian Lutheranism experienced was in the period between the First and Second World Wars. There was a chance to openly preach Christ in the western regions of Ukraine, which were under Polish occupation. After the defeat of the Ukrainian revolution and the collapse of the Ukrainian independent state, many people were analyzing reasons of numerous misfortunes of Ukrainian people and their faith; they were pondering the necessity to preach pure Gospel and have the Ukrainian Evangelical Church. A group of orthodox and Greek-Catholic priests turned to ancient evangelical principles. They managed to unite a considerable number of faithful into the Ukrainian Evangelical Church of Augsburg Confession, the direct ancestor of the present Lutheran church. This church managed to preserve and develop the eastern Ukrainian custom/worship, which is based on the liturgy developed by John the Chrisosdom. While preaching the pure evangelical theology, the church remains a national church of Ukrainian identity.

During a short period of time, its congregations sprang up all over the territories, which are now referred to as Galicia and Volyn. The main center was located in Stanislav (now Ivano-Frankivsk). Pastor Teodor Yarchuk was a Ukrainian spiritual guide. In 1931 in a periodical "See the Light!" ("Prozry!"), he in particular wrote, "We are Ukrainian evangelists. We love our Ukrainian people and customs of our forefathers. Despite all kinds of slander against us, we strive for spiritual renewal of Ukrainian people on the basis of truth of the divine Gospel. We look at Ukrainian men of genius Hryhoriy Skovoroda and Petro Kulish."

In a short run, the church included thousands of faithful who were at the same time patriots of Ukraine. There were congregations in Stanislav, Mykytyntsi, Krekhivtsi, Lutsk, Stari Bohorodchany, Kaminna, Zarvanytsya, Antonivka, Poberezhzhi, and in many other towns and villages. Churches were built, Sunday schools worked. The church also had a publishing house. One of the ULC leaders in the 1930s, Yuhym Folushnyak, wrote about the church, "Being native and inseparable part of Ukrainian soul... the church feels pains and troubles of the people and their needs... It can bring the Ukrainian nation great spiritual benefits, since people would then get rid of spiritual slavery and would reach considerable development and progress the way the other nations have reached" ("Styah" Banner, 1932, issue #1, pp. 3,4).






# **WELCA MINUTES April 21, 2022**

WELCA met on April 21, 2022, in Chilstrom Hall with Dianne Thorpe calling the meeting to order. The purpose statement was recited.

Pastor Tom gave the devotions and he told of the legend of the dogwood tree. According to the legend, the dogwood felt great sorrow for the role it played in Jesus Christ's death. While on the cross, Jesus sensed the tree's anguish, and he decided to transform it so that it could never again be used in crucifixion. From that point on, the dogwood was no longer a tall, stately forest tree. Rather, it became a small and shrub-like tree with thin and twisted limbs. While the dogwood tree never again took part in an execution, it's still said to carry the marks of Jesus' crucifixion. Its four large petals represent the cross he died upon, and each petal displays four red-tinged notches that are said to represent four nail holes. And in the center of each flower is a green cluster that is symbolic of Jesus' crown of thorns. The legend persists, and many Christians revere the beloved dogwood as it continues to remind them of Jesus' love and sacrifice.

The secretary's report was printed in the newsletter. Karen Eberhard handed out copies of the treasurer's report.

The Lord's Prayer was recited and we adjourned the meeting to work on inserting the roping in the school bags. The bags were all sewed by Iona Albright. Iona deserves a HUGH THANK YOU for all the bags she has sewed over many years.

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom.
