March 2023 Time with Tom

As the snow falls on this season of Lent, we are reminded of the beauty of God's creation. ~The Grief support group continues to meet the second Sunday of the month at 3:00 PM

~Pastor Tom has been asked by the MST USA group to help chaperone their trip in July. They will be going to Nashville TN

Team Reports:

*Christian Education:

~The team is still communicating with Green Lake Bible camp to help with Vacation Bible School (VBS). It appears the schedules are not working out to our advantage. They are planning an alternate VBS program if the Green Lake scenario does not work out. Quintin Berbue has been asked to help out with some Bible Camp songs if the team has to do the camp themselves.

~Ash Wednesday (now postponed due to weather) will be the Mentor supper with the Confirmation students.

~The team was planning to do the Lenten soup supper on March 1st but due to weather conditions, this will now be the Ash Wednesday service.

~Last day of Sunday school will be on May 7th and the students will lead the Sunday service.

~First Communion classes will be starting in 2 weeks

*Church Property:

~The team discussed replacing some of the heavy 8' tables in Chilstrom Hall. Good quality new tables would cost approximately \$210.00 each. A decision will be made at the next team meeting if we want to order some tables and how many.

~The team agreed to research if Finkens Water could service and fill the water softener as needed. Jim Alsleben will meet with Finkens and report back to the group at the next meeting.

~The west entrance enclosure was discussed and tabled. This is a larger project than many team members realized. To be re-visited at a later date.

Warm greetings from Johannesburg, South Africa.

After the long Christmas and New Year's Summer break (in the southern hemisphere), schools, businesses and churches are back in full swing. We continue to accompany companion churches across the continent in the areas of mission and ministry, diakonia, disaster response and international leadership development.

Gender Justice is a strategic priority for the ELCA Continental Africa Desk and 'Thursdays in Black' is one of the campaigns in this regard.

'Thursdays in Black' grew out of the World Council of Churches' Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women (1988–1998), in which the stories of gender injustice, abuse and violence were lifted up, as well as stories of women's resilience, agency and personal efforts to resist such violations.

The Watchword for the Year, "You are God, [who sees me.]" from Genesis 16:13, is the basis for the foreword in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa 2023 Almanac (lectionary and daily texts) by Presiding Bishop N.M. Myaka. Bishop Myaka writes, "The story of Hagar shows us that God does not only see but also reflects on and acts against injustice. ...This watchword challenges us...to consider supporting a 'Hagar

campaign' and to further explore one of the LWF's 500th anniversary slogans, 'Human beings are not for sale!' ... [T]ake heart in knowing that God sees you!"

The Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa (LUCSA), with 15 member churches in 10 countries, has also embraced the Thursdays in Black Campaign and is planning various activities for the coming year as part of its Gender Justice program.

Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9



TÜRKIYE & SYRIA EARTHQUAKE

SITUATION

On Feb. 6 two powerful earthquakes hit Türkiye and significantly impacted neighboring Syria. The first was a magnitude 7.8 earthquake in south central Türkiye, followed hours later by a magnitude 7.5 quake in the southeastern part of the country. The two quakes have devastated Türkiye and Syria, collapsing thousands of buildings and damaging infrastructure. Over 41,000 people have been killed, with the count expected to continue rising drastically.

Some history...

1919: This was the beginning year of the Women's Missionary Society initiated by Mrs. J. E. Linner. This group was interested in the work of foreign and home missions. They supported mission work in China, India and Africa. Their home mission work included Inner Missions, Institutions of Mercy and Migrant to include Mexican, Jewish, Indian and African American citizens. This group sewed quilts and clothing, collected clothing and other articles and financial support to the mission fields and parish and conference homes. They also conducted a number of prayer events in the parish.

1949: Pastor A. H. Franzen conducted his final worship service on September 25 after serving the parish for 20 years. At this time, the baptized membership had reached 741. The building fund had a balance of \$25,000. He died on February 22, 1954. Along with his wife, he is buried in Lake Ripley Cemetery.

1954: The congregation voted to purchase the present site, 703 South Sibley, at a cost of \$11,000, to build a new church. Total cost for the new church was approximately \$300,000.

1958: Herbert Chilstrom, baptized at Beckville Lutheran Church, confirmed at First Lutheran Church, was ordained into the ministry on June 22, 1958

1958: A Service of Thanksgiving was held at the old church on October 26. In the middle of the service the congregation exited the building and marched down Sibley to the new church. The Service of Thanksgiving was then completed in the sanctuary of the new church building.

1962: The United Lutheran Church of America, the American Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Swedish Augustana Synod merged to form the Lutheran Church in America. Dr. Chilstrom served as bishop of the Minnesota Synod for the years of 1976-1987.

1966: Our congregation membership reached 828 confirmed and 333 youth. This was the beginning of the internship program here at First. Intern John Schroeppel began in September. Our second intern was Bruce Robinson.

1970: Pastor Trued initiated the Mission Study Trip (MST).

1971: The Lutheran Church of America recommended the separating of First Communion from Confirmation.

150th Anniversary



Einar Lundin

Einar was born in 1927 in the upstairs bedroom, directly above the kitchen, of his childhood home. Einar has never lived anywhere else. He grew up with two brothers, John and Carl and one sister, Janet. His grandparents immigrated from the southern part of Sweden arriving in Meeker County, with one son. Later they had four daughters (one of them is Einar's Mom, Myrtle). His great Uncle and great Aunt also immigrated at that time. His grandparents lived in town while his great Uncle and Aunt had a seven-year lease on a farm SE of Litchfield. His Uncle grew tired of farming so Einar's grandparents took over the lease. In 1917 they moved to the current farm and this has been in the family ever since. The farm site had a barn, many out buildings and a shed for the well. There was a large hill east of all the building so the original house sat to the north. Later, they scrapped the hill off and built the house of today, so they would be closer the the barn. At this time, they had a water pipe installed from the well to the new house. The house had cisterns and two tanks in the basement. Somehow this water was pumped into the kitchen. They used a wood range which also had a water tank on the front for hot

At a young age (7-10), Einar drove the horses and wagon from the field. His Mom and Grandmother would drive the wagon of hay into the barn with three slings attached to lift the hay into the barn, emptying and repeating. As most farms during the early 1900s they had horses, pigs, chickens and dairy cows. Einar milked by hand. The family sold cream. They created a large pile of straw, which was used as bedding but they would dig out a hole/cave in the straw where the pigs would stay for the winter.

They had a gas engine in the barn to help with the milking stuff. On this engine was a tank for heating water (hot water for cleaning the milking equipment). Einar said they changed the hard screw (?) to a wood plug so they could easily get access to the hot water. Electricity was on the way but Einar's Grandmother said no.... we can get by. They used kerosene lanterns that would blow out in the wind. At some point, his Grandmother bought a windmill from John Deere.

Side note: at the age of 8, Einar rode in a Model T. His Great Aunt was to sail on the Titanic but she became sick and did not board. Things were beginning to change from wood to iron.

Einar attended the Carlson school for seven years. (It may be the schoolhouse south of their home, but you will have to ask him!) His aunt and uncle lived near Darwin and they had three girls. Einar and family would visit often... the neighbor girl would come down to play with the three girls. And that was the first meetings with Delores Johnson, Einar's future bride.

Einar's Dad, Albin, came from Sweden and landed in St Paul doing construction. Albin was in WW I. He was a hired hand then rented the farm from Einar's Grandmother. Albin is a charter member of VFW. Einar's parents shared hauling with two other farmers (co-op!) and they took turns hauling the milk to town. Einar worked on the farm. He joined the National Guard in 1947, and attended training once a week on a Thursday. As a guard, he was called to help with the So St Paul meat packing strike.

Einar is a lifetime member of First Lutheran Church. His family attended the first church built in Litchfield, South Park location. (note: some called this park "Swede Park".) He was baptized, confirmed and married at First Lutheran Church. He was a member of the Luther League. They would roller skate at the opera house, 35 cents for skate rental and skating. They would all change up partners to skate with and here Einar and Delores socialized together. Einar and Delores were married in 1950. To this marriage, came three children; Harold, Elaine and Judy. All three baptized and confirmed at First Lutheran Church and both girls married here. Harold lives near Beckville Church and Elaine is on the homestead. Einar did his share of volunteering at church, as a council member he was part of the group that hired, Bea, as organist. Einar, 95 years later, is still faithfully worshipping at First Lutheran Church. The Lord has blessed him with a long life and we are grateful that he has been part of our history.
