May 2023 Time with Tom

Do we have a reason to be afraid? What do we fear now that we have reached the year 2023? As children: so many things frighten us. It is not unusual for a parent to comfort their child by saying do not be afraid or it will be okay, I am right here by your side. Sometimes we say to our children, there is nothing to be afraid of, see, as we turn on a light or take them by the hand. Jesus before and after his death and resurrection often greeted his disciples with the statement, "do not be afraid". The scripture text used during May, we will hear Jesus telling us why we should not be afraid. There are many reasons we will combat his urging of peace simply because of the news we hear or read about every day. What can we do when we see such violence and terror around us constantly? The lack of support for our peace officers, the constant division and separation of every group in society seems to be tearing us apart even when the leadership of our country and state claim to want to bring us together.

Remind yourself, you are a child of God chosen by Jesus and sent to all nations, baptizing, making disciples and teaching them all Jesus, in his commands; told you.

Yes, it is not easy; nobody said it would be easy. We may not see the results of our hard work but if you remember, it is not about us, it is about our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Trust Jesus, do not be afraid, go and tell the story, so all people will know the love of Jesus. Amen

Mission

Dear friends,

Earlier this month parts of the southern African countries of Madagascar, Mozambique and Malawi were severely affected by Cyclone Freddie, which has been classified as one of the longest lasting and most powerful storms to hit the region. News outlets are reporting a death toll surpassing 500 with many tens of thousands left homeless or displaced due to heavy rains, flooding and mudslides.

Malawi has declared a National Disaster with a two-week period of mourning.

Evangelical Lutheran Church in Malawi presiding bishop Joseph Bvumbwe wrote: "On our part and for now we can only ask for your prayers to sustain us and help us gain the strength needed to stand back on our feet and start working on lending the much needed services to the affected Communities. ... As you can see from this briefing, the situation is so overwhelming and requires prayerful descernment and wisdom to help us provide hope to the hopeless."

ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response is providing support for relief efforts through the ACT Alliance rapid response fund. At the end of February I participated in the annual Youth Peer Educators' planning workshop organized by the Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa (LUCSA). The young adults gave reports from their respective churches and took turns presenting on topics such as: HIV&AIDS in the era of COVID-19, Mental Health, gender justice, substance abuse, teenage pregnancy, entrepreneurship, climate change, and the challenges and opportunities of using social media. I gave a presentation on disaster preparedness and response strategies. The workshop included an Ash Wednesday worship service with Holy Communion.

The ELCA supports the HIV&AIDS program of the Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa which includes 15 member churches across ten countries in the region.


Our full catered 150th celebratory congregation dinner (at noon) will be held on Sunday, August 27th.

150th Anniversary



Quilting at First Lutheran began from "scratch." This was a comment Louise Tostenruid made during our recent visit. She was one of eight or ten women who organized the activity in the 1950's.

They had no funds to purchase fabric, thread, yarn, or other supplies. Church members were asked to donate used clothing, curtains, sheets, blankets or whatever. At the time, women's slacks and men's trousers were often made of various synthetic fabrics which usually were darker colors. Everything was put to good use. Louisesaid the quilts weren't probably the most beautiful but they provided warmth and comfort.

When I joined the group, Helen Hydeen and Marie Langseth were cochairmen. I remember Evelyn Erickson's job was to take apart garments, curtains and so forth. Others cut and measured the material to make 22 inch square blocks. The blocks were sewn together to make a 60" x 80" finished top, the size recommended by Lutheran World Relief. Then they were put together with batting and a backing and tied with yarn. Finally, they were machine stitched all around the outer edges. Quilts are still made in this same fashion today. However, nothing is wasted and several women take home smaller pieces of material and cut various size squares to make finished tops.

There have been changes during the years. After using woven fabrics, double knits became popular. They weren't always a joy to sew, as they varied in weight and the amount of stretch. Fabrics not suitable for tops or backs of quilt were used as filler between the two. Later, we received polyester quilted batting from the Modern Quilters in town and this served as backing also. The colors were black and navy.

Thanks to memorials and other donations there is now a quilting fund to purchase batting and fabric, although many women donate fabrics they no longer need. This year there are twenty-seven volunteers who usually meet from 8:30 until noon(coffee break included) on the first and fourth Tuesday of each month from September through May.

More than one hundred quilts are made each year. They are given to Lutheran World Relief, local Social Services, Wings, needy families and disaster areas. Also each high school senior graduate who is a member of the congregation receives a beautiful quilt.

Our quilting ministry reaches out both near and far. The quilts are gifts of comfort and love. We all enjoy the fellowship and working together.

150th Anniversary

Mildred and Myrtle, the Oslund Twins

Though not identical, Mildred and Myrtle always dressed alike. Until you got to know them well, it was difficult to tell them apart. During the week they worked as tellers at the Northwestern National Bank on "Main Street" in downtown Litchfield. Almost always they walked to and from work from the home they shared with their widowed father at the east edge of town. Their pleasant back yard was like a small park, complete with a water fall and lovely flower gardens.

Though highly efficient at the bank, work in the teller's cage never seemed to be their chief aim in life. It was First Lutheran Church and their personal faith that always took priority. Whatever went on at church, they were there. Among other things, they served as leaders in the Sunday church school for what seemed like generations. One could not even begin to count the children whose lives were shaped by Mildred and Myrtle.

It was their passion for the youth of the congregation that touched my life most directly. After confirmation I spent a week at Green Lake Bible Camp. My life took a decided turn from what had been a casual, lukewarm interest in the Christian faith. Now I hungered for a deeper relationship with Christ. At First Lutheran that always meant getting better acquainted with Mildred and Myrtle. They led us in youth Bible class and even encouraged me to join the adult Bible study group. Though the only youth in that class, I felt completely at home, thanks largely to those two loving women.

It was in the youth group – the "Luther League" as we called it in those days -- that their influence on me was most pronounced. They were always there to give words of encouragement. When I was elected president of the League, it was the Oslund twins who came to our planning sessions, who attended our monthly meetings, and who encouraged us to attend Bible camp every summer. They never dominated. Like twin rudders on a ship, they were just there to gently give stability and direction.

When I decided to go into the ministry Mildred and Myrtle were major cheerleaders. After I went off to college and seminary, Pastor J. Henry Bergren invited me to preach at First Lutheran once a year. After those services I could always count on the twins to linger and give me a boost, consistently commenting on some aspect of the sermon they thought was especially helpful. On those Sundays the "loose offering" was given to me to assist with college and seminary expenses. I'm quite sure those modestly-paid bank tellers were among the most generous givers on those days.

Mildred and Myrtle never married, never had children of their own. But they had many children – children in the faith. I thank God that I could be one of them.
